\$30,000.00* Play-Mor Bonus Pool

Eligibility and Rules

Effective August 1, 2010.

To apply to all Play-Mor Dart League players through December 31, 2010 including all sanctioned bar tournaments (SBTs) beginning August 1, 2009.

What is the Play-Mor Bonus Pool and how to qualify?

The \$30,000.00* Play-Mor Bonus Pool for 2010 is available to all Play-Mor Dart League players - both All-Stars and Rising-Stars are eligible. Any Play-Mor Dart League player participating in at least ninety (90) nights - including subbing on nights where they are not a full time player, in any Play-Mor sanctioned dart league during the calendar year Jan. 1, 2010 through December 31, 2010; is qualified to earn a share of the Play-Mor Bonus Pool money. Note: In 2008, ten (10) players achieved this. In 2007, there were just five (5) players who exceeded ninety (90) nights of league play. Bonus pool money is guaranteed (see *note below) by Play-Mor Coin-Op and will be shared by all who qualify regardless of the number of players who do. Ten, twenty or fifty, however many it is, they will share the Bonus Pool money - as further explained below.

*Note: \$30,000 is based upon a minimum of 200 teams in the Play-Mor Dart League system during 2010. Play-Mor Dart League's current forecasts indicate the average number of teams anticipated is 240 up to 250 during this period. 200 is a conservative number, but due to the economy, we must set something of a prudent line for good business and safety. Should there actually be less than 200 teams – the pool will only be reduced a proportionate amount. Example: 180 teams instead of 200 will result in 10% reduction of the pool to \$27,000. Play-Mor Dart league will provide details about the team counts for the period along with pool money at time of Bonus Pool money distribution. Players can easily track team counts on the web to see for themselves as well.

When will the bonus money be paid?

All 2010 Bonus Pool money will be presented to the players who've earned it - at the first All Star Series of Darts event in January 2011 at check-in or mailed to anyone not in attendance following that event.

How is the money earned and how is it shared?

There are two steps to the Bonus Pool Money. First, all players who achieve or exceed ninety (90) nights of league play during the period- including subbing on nights where they are not a full time player; qualify for a share the Bonus Pool money. Then, each player who has qualified - will increase their share by earning points through participation and performance at the All Star Series of Darts events and in SBTs as follows:

The total number of nights played multiplied by the total points earned during the period (All-Star or Rising-Star points - depending upon the players point type). Then, after totaling all qualified player's points, calculate each individual share proportionate to the total.

Example # 1: Jim Smith is a Rising-Star player. He played 97 nights during the year. He attended 8 SBTs and was the highest finishing non-All Star once, earning 42 points in the 8 SBTs. He attended 4 All Star Series of

Darts events 4-person Team competitions and earned points at all four, but selecting his best three events by points he accumulated a total of 143 points. Add 42 to 143 for his total Rising-Star points of 185.

To calculate Jim's total bonus pool points multiply $97(\text{weeks}) \times 185(\text{RS points}) = 17,945$. For this example, we will presume there are 20 players who qualified for the Bonus Pool money during the year and where these player's total points came to 300,000 points. Divide Jim's 17,945 points by the 300,000-point total to determine Jim's proportionate share. This equates to 5.98%.

Jim's share is \$1,794.50, which is 5.98% of the \$30,000 pool.

Example # 2: Christa is an All-Star player. She played 107 nights during the year. She attended 10 SBTs. She was the highest finishing female five times, earning her 60 points in the 10 SBTs. She attended all five All Star Series of Darts events, competed in at least three non-main events during those weekends. She earned the maximum All Star bonus points at all five events but selecting her best three events by total points earned during the entire weekend, she accumulated a total of 191 points. Add 60 to 191 for her total All-Star points of 251.

To calculate Christa's total bonus pool points multiply $107(\text{weeks}) \times 251(\text{AS points}) = 26,857$. For this example, we will also presume there are 20 players who qualified for the Bonus Pool money during the year and where these player's total points came to 300,000 points. Divide Christa's 26,857 points by the 300,000-point total to determine Christa's proportionate share. This equates to 8.95%.

Christa's share is \$2,685.00, which is 8.95% of the \$30,000 pool.

Example # 3: Sherri is a Rising-Star player. She played 90 nights during the year. She attended 2 SBTs but was not the highest finishing non-All Star at either, earning her 10 points in the 2 SBTs. She attended one All Star Series of Darts events, competed in at least three non-main events during the weekend. She earned the maximum bonus points at that event but was beaten in the second round of the Team event. She earned just 42 points during that weekend for a total of 42 Rising-Star points. Add 10 to 42 for her total Rising-Star points of 52.

To calculate Sherri's total bonus pool points multiply $90(\text{weeks}) \times 52(\text{RS points}) = 4,680$. For this example, we will also presume there are 20 players who qualified for the Bonus Pool money during the year and where these player's total points came to 300,000 points. Divide Sherri's 4,680 points by the 300,000-point total to determine Sherri's proportionate share. This equates to 1.56%.

Sherri's share is \$468.00, which is 1.56% of the \$30,000 pool.

Note: points earned by Play-Mor Dart League players in sanctioned activities associated with the 2010 All Star Series of Darts beginning August 1, 2009 apply. All other rules pertaining to points earning options within the SBT rules and the All Star Series of Darts rules apply.
